# **Environment Committee - Food Security Plan Actions**

### Background

Bridport Town Council's <u>Climate and Ecological Emergency Action Plan 2023-2025</u> acknowledges the disruptive impacts climate change is having on the food and ecological systems that we all depend on. It also recognises the cumulative effects these changes are having on human health, well-being, and the cost of living. The development of a Food Security Plan (FSP) for the Bridport area is a collective effort to increase understanding of the complex web of interrelated issues and propose a roadmap towards a more sustainable food production and distribution system that will benefit the entire community.

The FSP envisions a localised food economy, emphasising agroecological practices and short food supply chains as solutions beneficial to the environment, soil health, consumers, and the economy. It makes the case that aligning food production with ecological harmony would not only mitigate the impact of shocks to the food system but foster healthier outcomes for people and the planet.

Environment Committee endorsed the Bridport FSP in March 2024 and agreed to undertake further consultation to develop a detailed action plan for the FSP. Implicit in the consultation was a recognition that delivery of the Bridport FSP would require co-ordinated input from a wide range of stakeholders.

This paper sets out the feedback from consultations (see Appendix 1) and presents a series of actions, proposed by partner organisations, that will accelerate transition to a more sustainable local food system. Securing the endorsement by the Town Council for FSP actions will help increase visibility and support for a rapid transition.

#### A revised Bridport Food Security Action Plan.

As a result of the feedback received, we are proposing a reduced but focused food security action plan that better reflects the ambitions and activities of landowners, farmers and local food organisations.

The development of the Brit Valley Landscape Recovery Project offers a huge opportunity to accelerate transition to a more sustainable local food system, one that includes re-focusing on local markets – providing fresh, healthy and sustainable food at affordable prices for the Bridport community.
